WISE WOMEN IN STEM

MAE CAROL JEMISON IS AN AMERICAN ENGINEER, PHYSICIAN AND FORMER NASA ASTRONAUT WHO IN 1992 BECAME THE FIRST AFRICAN AMERICAN WOMAN IN SPACE

This month we are celebrating Mae
C. Jemison who was the first African
American woman in space. Her
team embarked on September 12,
1992, aboard the space shuttle
Endeavor which orbited the earth
for almost 8 days.

Jemison initially worked with the Peace corps and later had her own private practice as a physician.

Nonetheless, Jemison decided to apply to the astronaut program at NASA in 1985. However, after the Space Shuttle Challenger explosion in 1986, NASA paused accepting new application.

This did not deter her and when she again applied to the astronaut program in 1987, she was one of the 15 people chosen out 2,000 applications.

Moreover, Jemison has had a distinguished career following her time at NASA, as both a Professor and entrepreneur, who cares deeply about

science and science education
